Emergency Preparedness Checklist For Your Pet

* Keep a one-to-two week worth of all supplies listed below in your emergency evacuation kit. Remember to rotate food, water and medications regularly to ensure freshness.

- Food*
- · Water* Store in gallon-sized plastic containers.
- Food and Water Dishes, a spoon and a manual can opener Use collapsible dishes.
- Litter Box and Cat Litter* Disposable litter boxes will be easiest.
- Feeding Notes Record your pet's eating habits (amount and times) as well as any allergies your pet
 may have.
- Cleaning Supplies Include paper towels and bleach.
- Photographs of your Pet In case you need to distribute pictures if your pet gets lost.



- Vaccine Records/Medical History Copies of important veterinary documents, such as vaccination records
 (Rabies/Distemper), medical history, medical conditions. You will need proof of vaccinations in order to board your pet.
- Veterinary Information Write down the name, address and phone number of your vet. Write down your pet insurance
 policy number, if you have one.
- Proof of Ownership/Animal Information Copies of registration information, adoption papers, proof of purchase, microchip, tattoo or other identification information.

- Medication* List each pet separately. Include dose and frequency for each medication. Don't forget reserve doses of flea and tick and heartworm preventatives.
- · Extra Collars, Harnesses, or Leashes
- Bedding and Blankets
- Identification Tags To write your temporary location or contact information on the tags.



- Brushes/Combs, Grooming Supplies
- Toys
- Animal Crates or Carriers Label with your contact information; make sure the animal
 has room to move around.
- Pet First-Aid Kit

Help Emergency Workers Help Your Pets

The ASPCA recommends using a rescue sticker alert to let people know that pets are inside your home. Make sure it is visible to rescue workers, and that it includes the types and number of pets in your household and your veterinarian's phone number.

If you must evacuate with your pets (and if time allows) write "EVACUATED" across the stickers so rescue workers don't waste time looking for them.

A large plastic tub or garbage can with a lid can be used to store these disaster preparedness items for your dog. Tape a copy of this list to the inside of the cover for future reference. Include a calendar indicating when certain items should be/were replaced.

In addition to the items listed above, include anything you use for your dog on a weekly or monthly basis. A good idea is to collect all the materials for your disaster preparedness kit, and then experiment by using only those items to care for your cat the next two weeks. That way, you will easily find out if you need to include other items, or a larger quantity of certain things.
