Executive Summary

In 2012, Piscataway continued to find ways to improve library service to our community.

This year the library was able to provide a haven following Superstorm Sandy. The library extended its hours to provide a place for community members to charge their electronics, use the internet, relax and be warm. Thousands of residents passed through our doors following the storm, and the sense of community among library users and staff was something none of us will ever forget.

In early February the library created a new Job Training and Teen Space at the Westergard Library, which added approximately 1,000 square feet to the busy branch. The new space has hosted 64 computer classes to a total of 313 community members, and many teens during after-school hours. The library also hosts programs for teens in the new space, such as the Viral Science program.

Public computer usage continues to be a well-used service by the community. The new public space at the Westergard Branch has provided more public computers, and hours of computer usage at the branch were up 15.3% in 2012. The Kennedy Library public computers were used over 27,000 hours in 2012, and the Westergard Branch public computers were used 19,000 hours.

As 2012 was coming to a close, the library staff worked to create the first maker space in a public library in New Jersey. Following the success of maker spaces in public libraries in Westport, CT and Fayetteville, NY, the library is excited to offer this opportunity to its community in early 2013.

Piscataway Public Library will continue to strive to provide the best library service to our community. We would like to thank all the people who support the library, particularly the Township of Piscataway, the Friends of Piscataway Public Library, private donors, the library staff and the Board of Trustees.

Library Budgets

Budget Notes:

- The Friends of the Library supplied nearly \$34,000 for renovations to the Westergard Branch.
- Sunday hours continued at Kennedy Library, and Saturday hours at the Westergard Branch in July and August were continued, plus increased Wednesday night hours at Westergard (to 9pm).
- A budget of \$8,500 was allocated specifically for the purchase of ebook titles for Piscataway residents.
- The Adult and Young Adult Program budget was increased to continue to provide citizenship classes following the end of grant funding.
- Responsible fiscal management of the budget allowed the library to replace the carpeting in the Children's Room and the front doors at Kennedy Library using unexpended funds.
- •Library fines and fees have provided funding for furniture for the Children's Room and equipment for the MiY:makeityourself project, both to be available in early 2013.

Technology Updates





- In 2012, the library now provides access to an app, LMXpress, available for Android and Apple devices.
- Added 8 public computers to the Westergard Branch.
- Upgraded wireless routers at the Kennedy Library to accommodate increased usage.

ebooks @ PPL

- ebook downloads increased by 70% in 2012.
- Kindle format books were added in September 2011, and now account for 50% of all ebook downloads in 2012.

Adult and Young Adult Services

- 273 Adult and Young Adult library programs were held at the Kennedy Branch in 2011. Attendance for programs was 4,248.
- In 2012, the library digitized The Piscataway Review, thanks to a grant from the Friends of Piscataway Library. The entire run of the newspaper is now searchable by keyword through our website.
- The library created Tween Treats to introduce programs designed specifically for children in grades 4-6.
- A section of the AIDS quilt was displayed in the library for 4 weeks, and the library scheduled programs related the topic.
- The library organized a program to assist veterans, for which we invited representatives from One Stop Career Center, Vet2Vet, VA NJ, and others. These organizations set up information tables and talked to vets about jobs, health care, benefits, stress, etc.

Adult and Young Adult Services (Continued)

- Provided 54 "Appointments with a Librarian," a service to assist people with resumes, career searches, and applying for jobs and unemployment.
- Proctored 69 exams for distance-learning colleges.
- Delivered materials to 10 homebound patrons on a monthly basis.
- Hosted two after-hours events for a total of 47 teens.
- Adult Summer Reading had a record 66 participants.
- 96 teens participated in Teen Summer Reading.

Children's Outreach

- The Children's Department staff visited area nursery schools and day care centers, presenting story times to 1,111 young children in the spring and 953 in the fall. The library also continued the Preschool Outreach Book Delivery to nursery schools and day care centers.
- The library visited Eisenhower School and presented story times, puppet shows and library trivia to 500 students.
- The Children's Department staff have started to visit two married student housing apartments at Rutgers, with over 45 people attending each story time.



Special Populations






- Piscataway Public Library continued offering citizenship classes following the ending of grant funding. The library offered 20 classes, with 149 total attendees.
- The library continues to offer Gaming for Children with Special Needs, hosting 11 sessions and 128 participants in 2012.
- In 2012, the library made 110 material deliveries to homebound Piscataway residents.
- With the Senior Center closed for renovation, the library hosted many of the senior programs in 2012.


Volunteers

- In Children's Services, 88 junior library volunteers, 45 at Kennedy and 43 at Westergard, helped the library run the Summer Reading Club, donating 1,534 hours to the library this summer.
- 339 hours were completed by S.A.I.L.
 Volunteers in cooperation with the Piscataway School District.
- The library also benefitted from nearly 167 hours of volunteer time from Rutgers Library School students.









Piscataway 2012: \$3.14 Total Material Expenditures Per Capita -- 2011





Adult Circulation Per Capita -- 2011











Piscataway 2012: 7.90

Library Visits Per Capita -- 2011




Public Internet Users Per Capita -- 2011



Piscataway 2012: .24 Children's Program Attendance Per Capita -- 2011




Piscataway 2012: .31 Program Attendance Per Capita -- 2011
