EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2013, Piscataway continued tailor our services to the diverse and evolving needs of the community.

In January 2013, the Piscataway Public Library opened the Make it Yourself (MiY) maker space, the first maker space in a public library in New Jersey. Since then we have had programs in robotics, electronics, sewing, 3D Design and printing and music production. In the summer we hosted our first maker camp, as a SUPER Affiliate for Make Magazine's Maker Camp, a six week program for youths, 12-18 years old. This June at the New Jersey Library Association Conference, Piscataway Public Library was presented with an Innovation Award from the New Jersey State Library for our MiY initiative. In November the library started open hours for the maker space, and multiple entrepreneurs have utilized the space to create prototypes for the ventures. We hope to continue to support this generation and the next generation of makers for years to come.

Increased usage of e-Content lead the library to increasing our funding for ebooks, and online databases such as Gale Virtual Reference. The addition of Zinio provides full downloadable magazine issues to all Piscataway residents. In 2014, we are again looking to provide more funds for eBooks to serve the increasing demand.

The library continues to be dedicated to pursuing grants to supplement the services we can offer to our community. In 2013 the library was awarded the Middlesex County Cultural and Heritage Grant, the New Jersey State Library Innovation Award and a Cove Point Foundation Grant. For 2014, the library has already been awarded aFINRA/ALA Financial Literacy Grant and a Cognizant Making the Future Grant!

Piscataway Public Library will continue to strive to provide the best library service to our community. We would like to thank all the people who support the library, particularly the Township of Piscataway, the Friends of Piscataway Public Library, private donors, the library staff and the Board of Trustees.

In 2013, the Libraries of Middlesex Automation Consortium added the Zinio service. Zinio allows library patrons to download full issues of nearly 120 magazines. Through December 31, 2013, 195 Piscataway library users have already downloaded magazines.

EBOOKS @ PPL

- ebook downloads increased by 48% in 2013.
- Kindle format books accounted for 59% of all ebook downloads in 2013.
- Piscataway residents now have access to over 5,551 Fiction, 1028 Non Fiction, and 1,126 Children and teen ebook titles in a variety of formats.
- Piscataway residents downloaded 9,465 titles, audio books and ebooks in 2012, compared to 6,488 in 2012.

Westergard Branch

One of the focuses for 2013 at the Westergard Branch was improving services to job seekers, which was accomplished by creating a dedicated job search computer terminal; developing and moving the print career collection to a highlight location toward the front of the building; and partnering with the Professional Services Group of New Brunswick (PSGNB) to offer a weekly meetup for job seekers. The job search computer was launched on June 24, and logged 90 sessions before the end of 2013.

The Branch also increased the number of programs hosted in the teen room at Westergard, including a variety of food crafts, Make It Yourself programs like Maker Thursdays, and Viral Video Science Demonstrations.


In an effort to better assist the community with technology questions, Westergard has added three weekly drop-in programs that provide one-on-one assistance: eReader Help, AskAnything: Smartphones and AskAnything: Tech Support.

ADULT AND YOUNG ADULT SERVICES

- 207 Adult and Young Adult library programs were held at the Kennedy Branch in 2013.
 Attendance for programs was 3,374.
- In January 2013, the library opened the first maker space in a public library in New Jersey. The grand opening of the space was attended by over 250 community members.
- The library hosted community building programs such as the Immigrant Experience and the Veteran's Roundtable.
- The library formed a partnership with the Professional Services Group of New Brunswick to help job seekers with their resumes and their job searches.



ADULT AND YOUNG ADULT SERVICES (CONTINUED)

- Proctored 52 exams for distance-learning colleges.
- Delivered materials to 10 homebound patrons on a monthly basis, including Parker Nursing Home residents. Also, lead first book discussion at Parker Nursing Home
- Adult Summer Reading had a record 221 participants compared to 96 in 2012.
- 85 teens participated in Teen Summer Reading.

CHILDREN'S OUTREACH

- The Children's Department staff visited area nursery schools and day care centers, presenting story times to 405 young children in the spring and 387 in the fall. The library also continued the Preschool Outreach Book Delivery to nursery schools and day care centers.
- The library visited Randolphville, Knollwood and Eisenhower schools, presenting storytimes, a puppet show and a library trivia game.
- The Children's Department staff have continue to visit two married student housing apartments at Rutgers, with over 40 people attending each story time.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES HIGHLIGHTS






- The Sandbox Blog had 52 child participants in the 4 contests offered in 2013. The blog received about 2,900 views in 2013.
- The Children's Department presented 5 diversity programs, including Chinese New Year, Sign Language, Cinco de Mayo, Diwali and a Muslim Journeys program. We hosted 195 attendees for the diversity programs in 2013.
- Increased Saturday programming was popular, including the following programs: Happy Birthday, Dr. Seuss, Mother's Day Tea, Donuts with Dad, Halloween Happenings and a Holiday program.

VOLUNTEERS


- In Children's Services, 85 junior library volunteers helped the library run the Summer Reading Club, donating 1,580 hours to the library this summer.

- The library also benefitted from nearly 85 hours of volunteer time from Rutgers Library School students.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT


- Piscataway Public Library hosted blood drives with New Jersey Blood Services, in 2013 our drives raised 180 units of blood






Total Materials Expenditures Per Capita -- 2012




Total Adult Circulation Per Capita -- 2012



Total Children's Circulation Per Capita -- 2012




Total Circulation Per Capita – 2012



Total Expenditures Per Capita -- 2012




Library Visits Per Capita -- 2012





Public Internet Uses Per Capita -- 2012




Children's Program Attendance Per Capita -- 2012


