Executive Summary

In 2014 we hosted another successful Summer of Make Makercamp for Piscataway Students, grade 4 to grade 12. This year our makercamp was funded by a Making the Future Grant from Cognizant which provided funding to allow us to let the students keep the equipment and projects they created. For 2015, we have been notified that our application for increased funding was approved by Cognizant and we will be opening the makercamp up to third grade students as well.

Our FINRA/ALA Financial Literacy Grant, over \$64,000, has provided funding for many programs here at Piscataway, online and at other local libraries. The programs have covered personal finance to investing to long term planning. A number of the programs are available at any time on our website. The financial literacy programs will continue in 2015.

The library also experienced a reorganization with the creation of a separate Teen Services Department. As our services to teens has increased, it was clear that more resources needed to be allocated to this increasing community need. This reorganization was made possible by a retirement which allowed this reorganization to actually lower library staff expenditures.

2014 was a year of strategic planning. Our organization looked back at our evolution since our last strategic plan and using feedback from our patrons and leadership, we revised our mission and included what our organization promises to our residents in order to best serve their needs.

Piscataway Public Library will continue to work to develop around our new strategic plan. We would like to thank all the people who support the library, particularly the Township of Piscataway, the Friends of Piscataway Public Library, private donors, the library staff and the Board of Trustees.

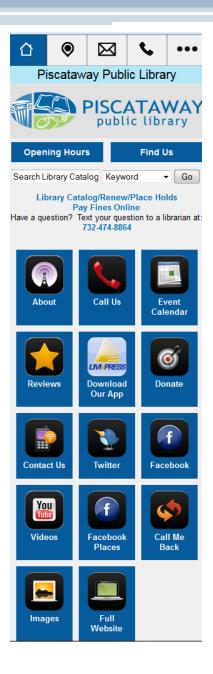

Adult Services

- 317 Adult library programs were held at the Kennedy Branch in 2014. Attendance for programs was 3,102.
- The library continues a partnership with the Professional Services Group of New Brunswick to help job seekers with their resumes and their job searches.
- The library received a grant from Walmart to increase our ESL materials.
- The library also received a \$1250 Walmart
 Community grant to purchase additional laptops
 for technology and outreach programs. Coding for
 Girls is an example of the programs the laptops will
 be utilized for.

Children's Outreach

- The Children's Department visited 19 area nursery schools and day care centers this year, presenting story times to 1,198 young children in the winter/spring and 1,081 in the fall. The library also continued the Preschool Outreach Book Delivery to nursery schools and day care centers.
- The Library conducted a campaign to sign up every student in grades fourth to eighth for a library card. Approximately 220 cards were given out. The Children's Department visited 3 elementary schools and saw 600 students at Randolphville, 509 students at Knollwood and 544 students at Eisenhower Schools. We presented story times, a puppet show and a library trivia game for students and teachers in grades K 3.
- The Children's Department also completed a library card campaign for first grades and gave out 1389 cards at those 3 schools.
- The Children's Department made four visits to the two Rutgers Married Student Housing Apartment complexes, presenting story times for 83 people.
- Our outreach efforts continue to include delivery of books on special subjects to the Timothy Christian and the Yeshiva Schools and scheduling class visits to the library on request. We began a partnership with Timothy Christian School in January 2014. Thirty-four 5th graders visited in late January to begin work on a research project. Twenty three kindergartners from the Yeshiva School visited in December for a story time and a tour.

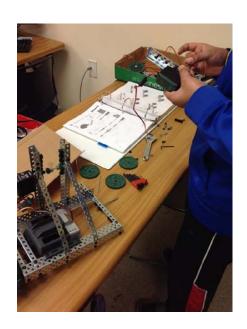

- The User Services Department benefitted from 767 hours of volunteer time in 2014.

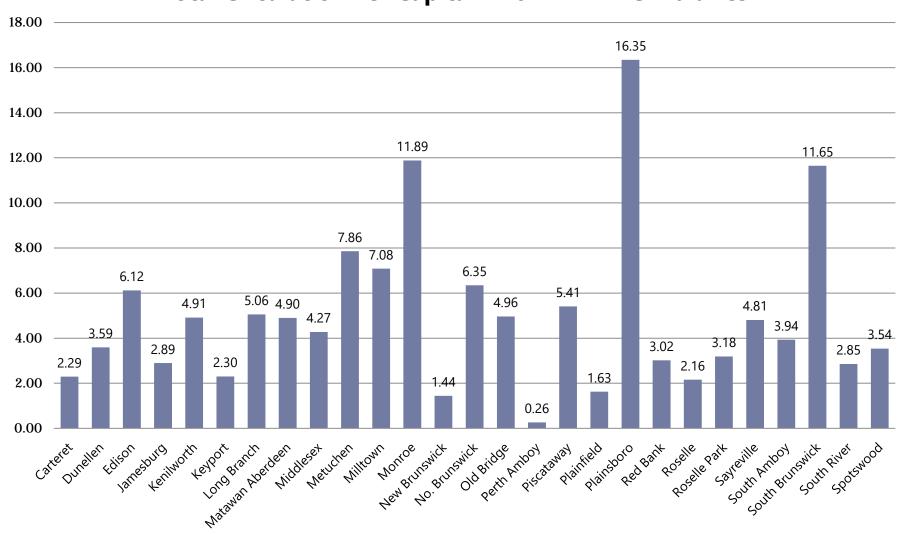

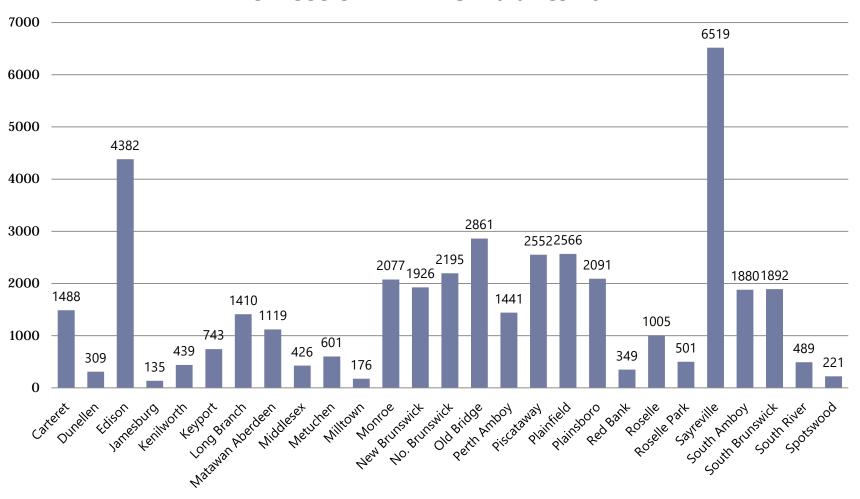
- Piscataway Public Library hosted 4 blood drives with New Jersey Blood Services. In 2014 our drives raised 140 units of blood

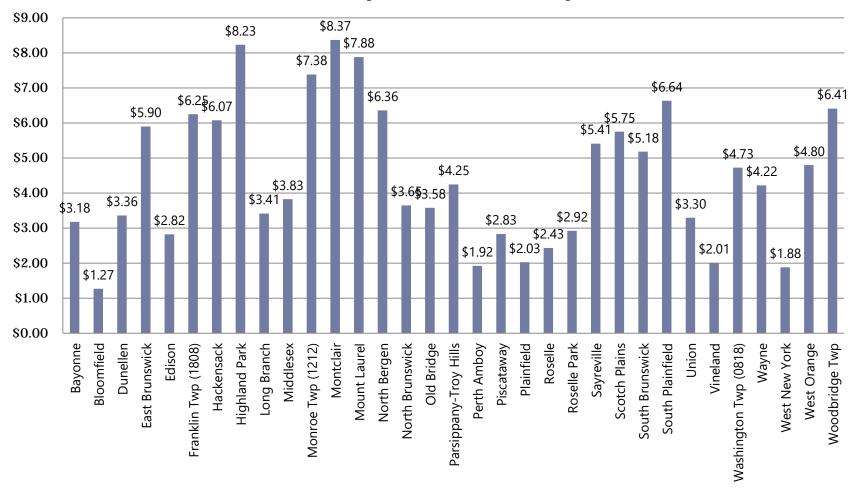

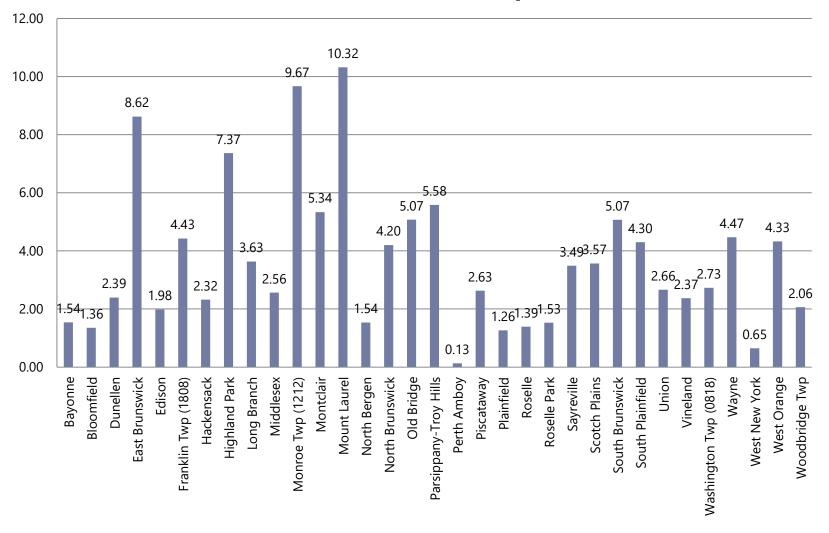

Total Materials Expenditures Per Capita -- 2013



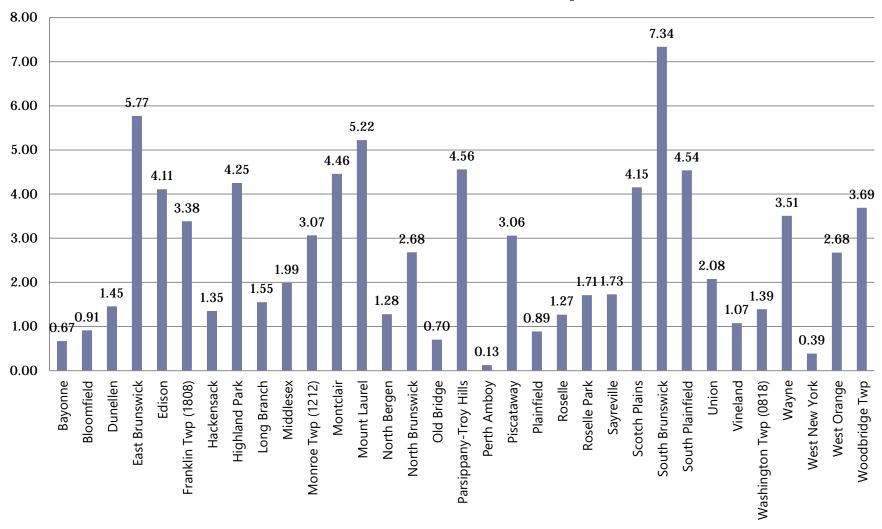
Piscataway 2014: 2.45

Total Adult Circulation Per Capita -- 2013



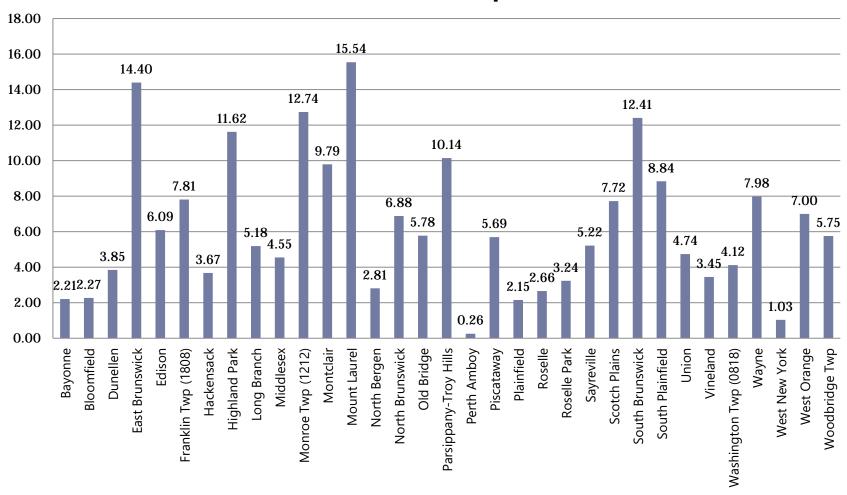
Piscataway 2014: 3.04

Total Children's Circulation Per Capita -- 2013



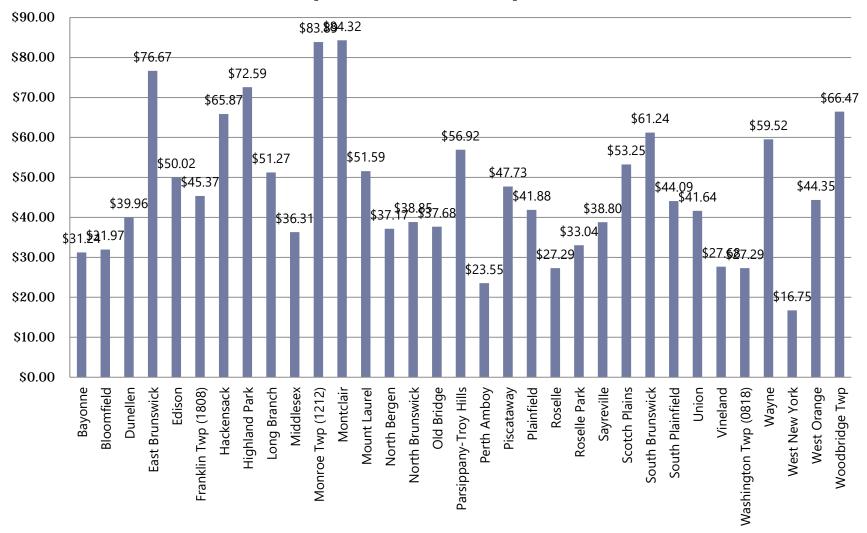

Total Circulation Per Capita -- 2013



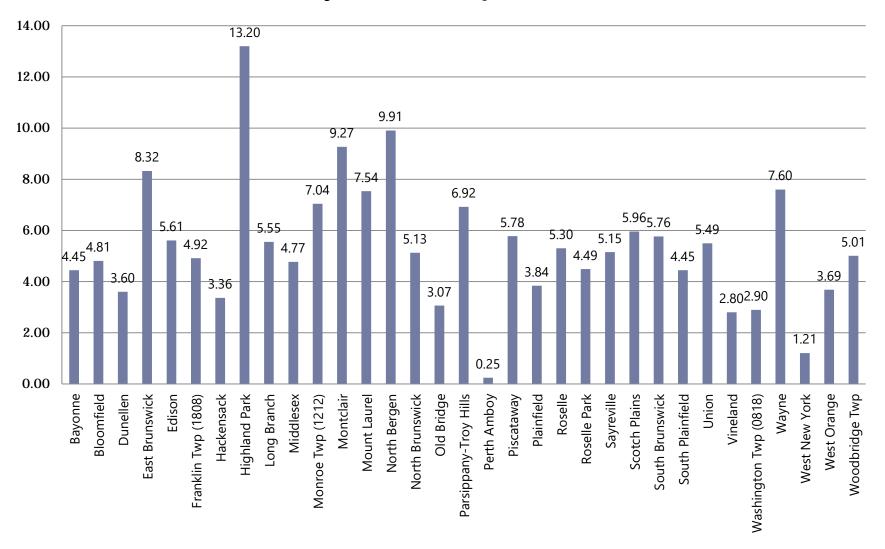

Total Expenditures Per Capita -- 2013



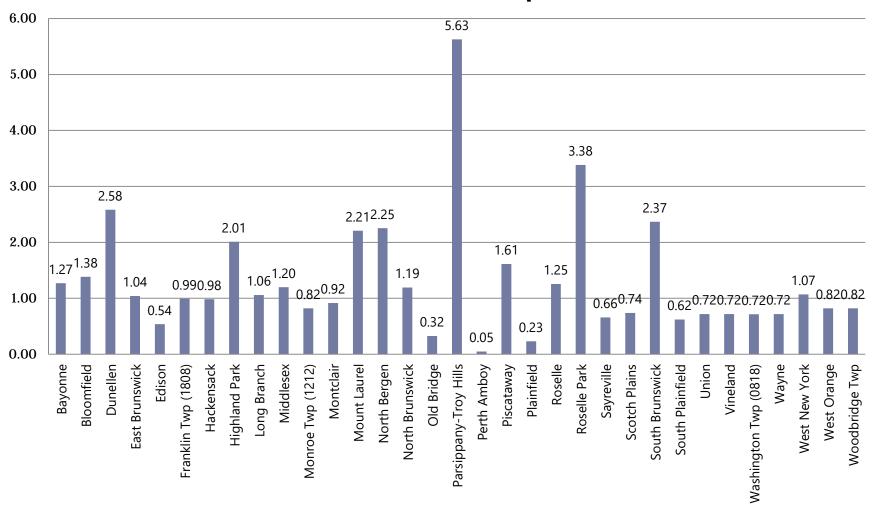

Library Visits Per Capita -- 2013

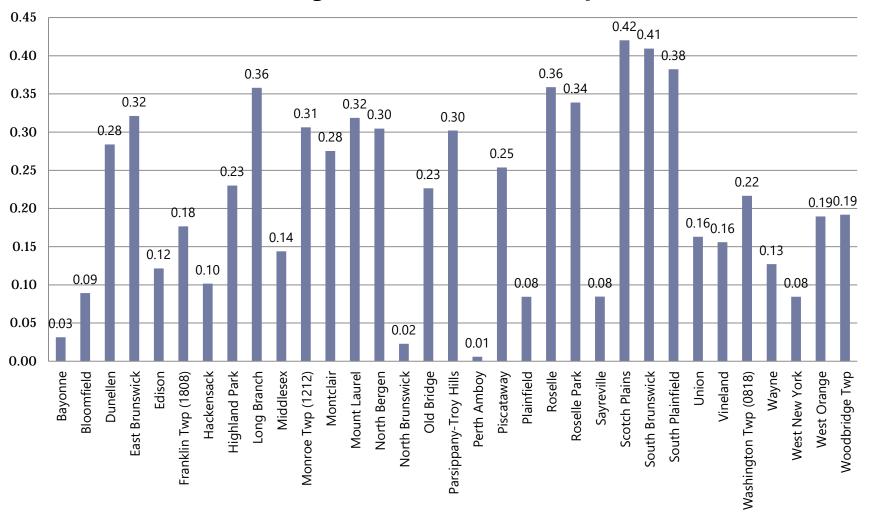

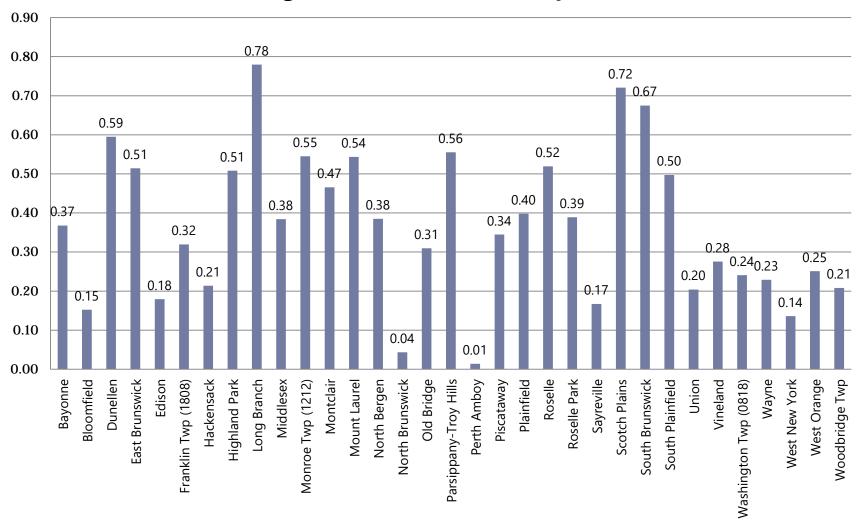
Public Internet Uses Per Capita -- 2013



Children's Program Attendance Per Capita -- 2013

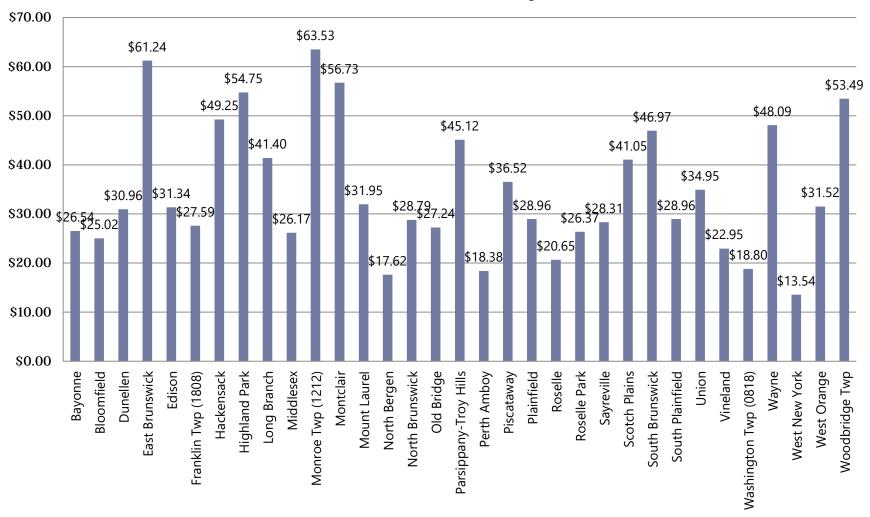


Total Program Attendance Per Capita -- 2013
